RAILROAD DAMAGES.—It will be noticed by the Court proceedings that Messrs. Hiram Woodward, of Huxton, Robert McHaffey, of Bell, John Lawshe, of Osceola, Daniel Goodlander, of Luthersburg, James Forrest, of Lawrence, John J. Reed, of Curwensville, and Dr. J. W. Potter, of Karthaus, were appointed to view and assess the damages (if any) to land owners along the line of the Tyrone & Clearfield Railroad.

CONSTABLES QUALIFIED, The following persons were qualified for Constables of their respective districts for 1868:

A petition was presented, signed by forty-seven inhabitants of Bell, Ferguson and Penn townships, praying the creation of a new township out of parts of these townships.

The next was a case in the Oyer and Terminer. Isaac Morrison was indicted for the murder of John Higgins, on the 15th of July last.

The Commission and Auditors are busily engaged in settling and adjusting the annual accounts of the Treasurer and other county officers.

To revive, vacate and supply a road from the Chest Creek road, near William Hutton's, in Burnside township, to or near Warrall's fields, in Chest township.

For a road from Rumbarger's shanty, to intersect the Beech Woods road near James Dixon's, in Brady township.

For a road from Hain's road, thence by the nearest and best route to the Daily road at his new farm, in Penn township.

For a road from the public road leading from Hunter's school house to the Kiyertown and Grahamton roads.

The order issued at September term, to view a road from John Dressler's, in Union township, to Sandy Lick Creek, on lands of John De Bois, thence to a public road near Frederick Shaffer's, in Brady township, was enlarged to March term.

For a private road from the Morrissdale and Philipsburg roads, at or near Wm. Rothrock's, to the Moshannon Creek, at the big bend, in Morris township.

For a private road from the Morrissdale and Philipsburg roads, at or near Mrs. Waring's, to the Moshannon Creek, at or near the Bell landing, in Morris township.

To vacate and supply the road leading from the road near John Schryver's, to the river, at the lower bridge, in Lawrence township.

The order to view a site for a bridge across Chest Creek, at or near Jacob Shock's, in Brady township.

A road leading from the road from the Indiana county line to a point on the road near Langdon's mill, in Burnside township.

A road from Kuhn's road, near Newcomer's, to the Clearfield and Karthaus roads, near Alex. Irwin's, in Girard township.

To vacate a part of the road commencing at Sandy Cross-roads, and thence to Mignott's school house, in Covington township.
