TO PREVENT DEBTS IN COMMON OF TIMBER LANDS FROM CUTTING OR REMOVING TIMBER TREES WITHOUT THE CONSENT OF ALL THEIR CO-TENANTS.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That from and after this date it shall be unlawful for any owner or owners of any undivided interest in timber land within this Commonwealth to cut or to remove, or to cause to be cut or removed from the said land, any timber trees, without first obtaining the written consent of all co-tenants in said premises.

SECTION 2. That no sale of any timber cut or removed from such undivided lands before or without such consent shall pass any title thereto, and the parties injured shall have every remedy in law and equity for the recovery of the said timber trees and of all square timber boards, lumber, staves, shingles, and other articles whatsoever manufactured therefrom, and also for the recovery of damages for the cutting or removing of the same, which they now have against an entire stranger to the title.

SECTION 3. Upon the violation of the provisions of the first section of this act, it shall be lawful for any of the parties in interest to sue out a writ of estoppel to prevent any further cutting thereon or the removal of any timber then already cut, or both; which writ shall be of force until the interests of the parties shall be set out in severalty, or the writs dissolved by the court, or the action of partition in reference to said land finally ended. The said writ of estoppel shall be obtained by affidavit and allowance, in the same manner and with like proceedings as are now by law allowed and authorized in cases of estoppel issued pending actions of ejectment for real estate.
