The Swallows.—Speaking of the swallows, the Lancaster Intelligencer uses the following language by way of caution to thoughtless boys: "We notice that some thoughtless boys are in the habit of throwing sticks and stones at the swallows as they go twittering and skimming through the air but a few feet from the ground. This should not be allowed. The swallow feeds entirely on insects, and is one of the best little friends of the fruit-grower that lives. If the boys knew that every swallow killed deprives somebody of a good mess of fruit, perhaps they would not so mercifully use their clubs on them; and yet it is a fact that almost all our fruit would be destroyed by caterpillars and other insects if it were not that these are destroyed by thousands by the swallows and other insectivorous birds."

Hard on Traveling M. D's.—The following bill was passed by the last legislature and has received the signature of the Governor, and is now a law:—

An act to regulate Medical Practice in certain counties in this Commonwealth.
Section 1. Be it enacted, That from and after the first day of April, A. D. 1878, it shall be unlawful for any person to commence or continue the practice of medicine or surgery in any of the counties of Berks, Chester, Columbia, Lancaster, York, Adams, and Dauphin, unless he shall have taken the oath of office, and shall have been examined by a board of examiners, and shall have received a diploma from the same.

SINGULAR OCCURRENCE.—On Friday the 6th instant Mr. Warfel, the express agent at this station received a telegram from Tyrone inquiring if a person named Conrad Hahn resided here, and stating that a corpse consigned to him was awaiting transportation at that place. He replied in the negative, but of course, the body was sent on next day. Arrived here, there was no one to receive it, and it could not be ascertained that either Conrad Hahn or Charles Wedekind, to either of whom it was addressed, resided in the community or vicinity. Mr. Warfel at once telegraphed in many directions to learn if this was the Philadelphia to which it should have been sent, and in response received word that its destination was Philadelphia, Clarion county. Accordingly it was reshipped to Pittsburgh to be forwarded from there to the proper place for delivery. The deceased was John F. Wedekind, member of the firm of Wedekind & Hahn, merchants, Ashley, Ohio, who, the telegraph informs us, came to his death by suicide.—Philadelphia Journal.

A WOMAN SHOT.—The miners at the Berwyn Furnace, on the D. & H. R. have been on a strike for higher wages for a couple of weeks. One day last week, one of the strikers, wearied by inaction or incited by want, went to work at old prices.—The night of that day, two or three shots were fired into his house, and a bullet took effect in the leg of his wife, inflicting a painful wound. It is thought that the shooting was done by the strikers, and that the intention was either to kill the miner, or to prevent him from going to work. The woman, however, is not so seriously injured as it is reported. She is now recovering from her wounds, and is expected to be able to go to work again in a few days. THE LARK OF A NOBLE HOUSE.—A Louisville despatch informs us of the death of Theodore Clay, the last son of Henry Clay.
