

*Our Nominees.*

The proceedings and tabular statement of the result of the Democratic Primary election in this county on the 11th will be found elsewhere in this issue.

The popularity of our nominees is fully established by the large vote polled in the county, and that received by the respective candidates. The aggregate vote reached nearly 2,500, the largest ever cast at a similar election. Another significant fact is established by the election returns and that is, the large and almost unanimous vote received by some of the candidates in their own townships and neighborhoods.

John G. Hall, our nominee for Assembly, is a lawyer by profession, a citizen of Elk county. Having been elected last fall and behaved himself while in the Legislature, he encountered no opposition, and will of course receive the district nomination and election equally easily.

Justin J. Pie, a citizen of Girard township, and by strict attention to business, and endowed with industrious habits, has gained for himself and family a competency in the double capacity of Blacksmith and Farmer, and will no doubt make a good Sheriff. He has four rivals either of whom would have made good Sheriffs; but the lower endors had "the longest pole," hence they got "the persimmons." The party never had better men in the field for this office.

David Buck, is a resident of Clearfield, and the present borough Constable. He will no doubt discharge the duties of Commissioner with honesty and fidelity. He is a one armed soldier; and like the Radicals love "the boys in blue" so excessively, but never give them an office, they will of course, like the Democrats, all vote for the named soldier.

A. W. Walters, the nominee for District Attorney, is a young lawyer of fair abilities and lacks nothing to make an excellent officer, which we have the confidence he will prove to be.

Jacob A. Faust, the nominee for Jury Commissioner, resides in this borough, and has been acting in that capacity for two years past. He is particularly well qualified for the position, from his extensive acquaintance with the citizens of the county.

D. Aaron Wise, is a successful merchant in Knox township and possesses all the necessary qualifications to audit the public accounts.

Samuel A. Caldwell is a resident of Bradford township and will of course make a good Coroner.

We have thus given in detail the names and localities from which our nominees hail, and in common with our party friends rejoice that they are all Democrats of unimpeachable character and that their triumphant election is a foregone conclusion, and further, that the dark and bloody cloud of Radicalism which has overhung our country for ten years past is about being tinted with a silver lining, and by the middle of November next, the whole land will again be illuminated by the noonday sun of Democracy, under whose genial rays alone, we can be happy, united people, and a dignified and prosperous nation.

**Torn to Pieces.**

TERrible affair in a traveling circus—three men devoured alive by lions.

The usually quiet little village of Middletown, Missouri, was lately thrown into a painful fever of excitement by an awful catastrophe which occurred to the band lately attached to James Robison & Co.'s circus and animal show, and led by Prof. M. C. Sexton.

Upon starting out from Cincinnati for the season, the managers determined to produce something novel in the way of a band chariot, and conceived the idea of mounting the band upon the colossal den of performing Numidian lions, and which would form one of the principal and most imposing features of the show.

Although warned by Professor Sexton that he deemed the cage insecure and dangerous in the extreme, the managers still persisted in compelling the band to ride upon it. On the fatal morning of the 12th, the band took their places and the procession commenced to move amid the shouts of the multitude of rustics who had assembled to witness the grand pageant, and hear the enlivening strains of music. Not a thought of danger was entertained by any one, but the awful catastrophe was about to occur.

As the driver endeavored to make a turn in the street the leaders became entangled and threw the entire team into confusion, and lost control of them, and becoming frightened they broke into a violent run. Upon the opposite side of the street the forewheel of the cage came in contact with a large rock with such force as to cause the braces and stanchions which supported the roof to give way, thereby precipitating the entire band into the awful pit below.
