**SUMMER ARRANGEMENT.—The new Railroad Time Table went into operation on Monday last. Two passenger trains run now regularly over the Tyrone and Clearfield Road. The Mail Train leaves at 2 o'clock, P. M., and arrives at 11:45 A. M. The Express leaves at 5 o'clock in the morning and returns the same day at 9:30 o'clock in the evening. Under this arrangement passengers can leave this place and go to Bellefonte, Lock Haven, Williamsport, Hardsburg, or Hollidaysburg, and all intermediate places, and return the same day. This is truly a grand arrangement, for which the public will no doubt thank the officers of the road.**

**HORRIBLE MURDER.—On Monday evening last, Samuel Jordan, a farmer residing in Oliver township, most horribly murdered his wife, literally slopping her to pieces with an axe. It appears that Mr. Jordan and his wife, daughter of Mr. David Henry, were pursuing the usual routine of chores about the farm, and no visible change was apparent in the manner of Mr. Jordan, until he suddenly took up the axe from the wood pile in the yard and dealt her several heavy blows, causing almost instant death, the head being nearly severed from the body. Jordan's brother was present and saw the act committed, but was unable to prevent the horrible tragedy.—After committing the deed he endeavored to cut his own throat with the axe, but was only successful in inflicting a severe wound. Yesterday morning he was brought to town and confined in jail, to await the disposition of the Court.**

**We are informed by those acquainted with Jordan since childhood, that he is a smart, industrious, and honest young man, but for some time he has shown signs of insanity, but not until present has he been violent or disposed to act viciously. Both parties, the murderer and murderer, belong to the most respectable families, and deeply feel their real affliction.—*Granville Journal.***
