

Extraordinary Physical Strength.

The strength and dexterity of the "hamals" of Constantinople in carrying enormous burdens, says the Levant Herald, proverbially only it is surprising to see one of these poor Eastern porters quietly plodding his way up and down some hilly street with a perfect mountain of material piled upon his back. The loads they carry are most miscellaneous, but even old residents, biases on that point, were astonished recently to see a hamal staggering along the Grande Rue de Pera with a large four-wheeled carriage - all complete - except the horses - lashed on to his porter's knot. It would be interesting to know what are the habits and diet of this powerful hamal. Is he an early riser? Is he a teetotaler? Does he smoke? and how did he bring himself into such condition that he can carry a carriage instead of requiring a carriage to carry him? His muscular power must far exceed not only that of Milo, but even that of the famous English athlete, Thomas Topham, of Islington, who on the 21st of April, 1839, advertised himself to perform several feats of strength at the Nag's Head, Gateshead, on the 23d of that month, namely: "He bends an iron poker, three inches in circumference, over his arm, and one of two inches and a quarter round his neck, he breaks a rope that will bear 2,000 weight, and with his fingers rolls up a pewter dish of seven pounds hard metal; he lays the back part of his head on one chair and his heels on another, and, suffering four men to stand on his body, he moves them up and down at pleasure; he lifts a table six feet in length by his teeth, with a 100 weight hanging at the further end of it, and lastly, to oblige the public, he will lift a but of water." Topham, however, did not, like the hamal of Constantinople, carry a four-wheeled carriage on his back, nor did his extraordinary strength conduce to the equanimity of his temper or to his peace of mind, if we may judge by his end, for in the obituary notices of last century it is stated that on August 10, 1749, "died, Thomas Topham, known by the name of the Strong Power, master of a public house in Shoreditch, London. In a fit of jealousy he stabbed his wife, then cut his own throat and stabbed himself, after which he lived two days."

Lapis Lazuli.

This mineral, which is called azure stone by the vulgar, is of a magnificent blue color, sometimes spangled with beautiful gold spots, from flakes of sulphuret of iron throughout its mass. It occurs in shapless blocks, or rounded pebbles, or, at times, in prismatic forms, having four sides, obliquely set. It is of a compact grain, opaque and hard; will cut glass and strike fire from iron. It is found principally in Persia and in the neighborhood of Lake Baikal, in Siberia, and is highly prized for jewelry and ornamental work. The purest specimens are reserved to cut for gems, and to make those rare Florentine mosaics, so much admired. A quality less rich goes to the decoration of the houses of the wealthy. The halls of the Orloff Palace, at St. Petersburg, are papered throughout with Lapis Lazuli from the Grand Bankharrie. The coloring matter of this stone gives that beautiful blue which is called ultramarine, not because it is beyond a sky-blue, but that it was brought from beyond the sea, namely, the Levant. It is procured in a sort of soap-making process, by the use of chemical agents. Exposed to a strong fire, the mineral mass melts to a yellowish-black paste. Simply calcined, it is deprived of its color by strong chemicals, and leaves a spot of jelly. There exist some massive fragments of lazulis, but the mineral is usually combined with foreign matters, so that a specimen quite pure and bulky attains a high price. The French treasury has a magnificent lazulite cup, shaped like a sea-shell, and worth two hundred thousand francs, or forty thousand dollars. There is also a bowl, or hand-dish, valued at sixteen thousand dollars, which is made of it. French coins are clean hands; and there, too, you may see a sabre, with a lazulite hilt, worth twelve thousand dollars, the gift of Tippoo Saib to Louis XVI; and three chaplets, of a thousand francs each, on whose beads of lazuli the royal nobles send their prayers lazily - when the Red Republicans were not after them.

Worked to Death.

We do not refer to mechanics, agriculturists and day-laborers, who do what is called the "hard work" of the world. It is not often that they work themselves to death. Physicians labor themselves to die. An overstrained muscle does not impair the vital energy. An arm or a leg can even be cut off without injuring the health of the body that it is cut from. It is not so with the brain. When that is overtasked the whole body suffers. When the brain is enfeebled by the strain of overwork, the vital principle is stopped. Nor can a sprained brain be reset, as a sprained ankle or a sprained wrist can.

And so it is the brain-workers that work themselves to death - professional men and business men who make haste to become famous or rich, or both, or who from sheer uncontrollable energy task themselves beyond their mental endurance. It is estimated that over a thousand such have been ordered to Europe this season by their physicians, whether they go so much against their will, in quest of that health which they have rashly squandered. They have expended their health to get money, and now they spend their money to get health. But health, like time, when once lost never returns - at least not in its original fullness and power. A man may be ill, have a run of fever, or even the small-pox, without losing his health, in the sense in which that famous phrase is used. From such a temporary illness he may perfectly recover. But when the man strikes at the very core of life by straining his brain, it is doubtful if he ever again tastes the joy and gladness of vigorous, elastic health. By rest and recreation he may recuperate and feel fresh and vigorous; but as soon as he goes to work again he will be apt to work more superficially, his health will be, and if he does not rest, he will inevitably be laid away with the countless thousands who have worked themselves to death.
