Though our crop of rasenls is heavy, we do not grow our homp; though we are overrun with lads who deserve flagellation, we import our willows. Our women (unless deceived) shine in foreign fabrics, and our men are dressed in foreign clothes. We are like the farmer who hires his neighbors' sons to cut his wood, feed his stock, and run his errands, while his own boys loaf around saloons and spend their time in playing billiards and gambling, and then wonders why, in spite of his bost offorts, he sinks annually deeper and deeper into debt, till the sheriff cleans him out, and he starts West to begin again. The time has come for us to turn over a new leaf. Our boys and girls must be taught to love labor by qualifying themselves to do it efficiently. We must turn out fewer professionals, and more skilled artisans and producers and so successfully augmented year by year. We must qualify our clever boys to creet and run factories, saw-mills, rolling-mills, machine-shops, tanneries, to open and work mines, improve and fashion implements, and double the products of the farm. If we shall adopt this policy, and then take such measures as will correct the abuses growing out of our mammoth railway priviloges, we shall witness a true development of national prosper-ity that will be as firm as the ever-


