Mr. Wallace as a Railroad Man.

Such is the caption of an article relating to Senator Wallace's late railroad speech, which we find in the Pittsburgh Telegraph, (U. S. District Attorney Swoope's paper), of the 22d of August. The editor remarks: "We have a copy of a characteristically clear and pointed speech delivered by Hon. William A. Wallace, of this State, Vice-President of the Texas and Pacific Railroad, at the celebration of the opening of the line between Dallas and Sherman, Tex., on the 13th of August. Mr. Wallace spent in less than two months the Texas and Pacific Company has graded and bridged nearly 400 miles of railway, have laid the track, built the machine shops, and fully equipped with engines and other rolling stock, nearly one-half thereof, have the iron and ties upon the ground to complete the whole before the 1st of December, 1873, and have changed the gauge and fully equipped an old line of sixty-six miles so that by that date they will have in full operation nearly five hundred miles of railway within the State of Texas. In doing this they have expended about \$10,000,000, and neither bond nor mortgage to the extent of one dollar has been executed for this purpose. The Texas road to the Gulf, Mr. Wallace claims will be six hundred miles shorter than any of its rivals, from ocean to ocean, while the ease and cheapness of water transportation from points on its line to the Mississippi will enable ores and other heavy articles to reach the northern cities at cheaper rates than by any other route. By the completion of the Jefferson division of the road communication between Galveston and St. Louis will be made one hundred and fifty miles shorter than by any existing line, and the people of the whole of Texas will thereby have a speedy and short line north. We quote this extract from the conclusion of Mr. Wallace's speech. It will be seen he talks sound sense to the Texans."

Its Definition.

Hon. William Allen, the Democratic nominee for Governor of Ohio, in a late speech gave the following rather lengthy but excellent definition of Democracy. He says: "Democracy is a sentiment not to be appalled, corrupted or compromised. It knows no baseness; it cowers at no danger; it oppresses no weakness;—Fearless, generous and humane, it rebukes the arrogant, cherishes honor, and sympathizes with the humble. It asks nothing but what it concedes; it concedes nothing but what it demands. Destructive only of despotism, it is the sole conservator of liberty, labor and property. It is the sentiment of freedom, of equal rights, of equal obligations. It is the law of nature pervading the law of the land. The stupid, the selfish and the base in spirit may denounce it as a vulgar thing; but in the history of our race the Democratic principle has developed and illustrated the highest moral and intellectual attributes of our nature. Yes—it is a noble, a magnificent, a sublime sentiment, which expands our affections, enlarges the circles of our sympathies, and elevates the soul of man, until, claiming an equality with the best, he rejects, as unworthy of his dignity, and political immunities over the humbles of his fellows. Yes—it is an ennobling principle—and may that spirit which animated our fathers in the revolutionary contest for its establishment continue to animate us, their sons, in the impending struggle for its preservation."

Under a shed in Harrisburg, Pa., says a New York correspondent, there stands a wagon loaded with pine boards. It is a partial wreck, for those boards were loaded on one day in 1812. The shed, too, is tottering with age and decay.
