

CONSTITUTION

New Constitution Proposed to the Citizens of the Commonwealth for their Approval or Rejection, by the Constitutional Convention.

Published by order of the Secretary of the Commonwealth, in pursuance of the 4th section of an act of the General Assembly, passed on the 21st day of April, 1872, and approved to amend the Constitution, passed the 11th day of April, A. D. 1872.

PREAMBLE

We, the people of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, do hereby propose to the citizens of this Commonwealth, for their approval or rejection, the following Constitution, to be known as the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, to be in force from the first day of January, 1874, unless it shall be rejected by the people at a general election held on the 1st day of October, 1873.

ARTICLE I.

DECLARATION OF RIGHTS

That the general, great and essential principles of civil liberty and private property are recognized and unalterably established, we declare that...
