It is said that Jim Lane, the leader of the "Horror Shriekers" in Kansas for the three or four years past, is in alliance with Brigham Young's movements in Utah.

One evening last week Miss Prather was married at her father's house in Clark county, Indiana, and had got on horseback to accompany the bridegroom to his home, when her horse was frightened by a party of young men coming to cheer the marriage company, and, starting suddenly, threw her off and broke her neck.

Two elderly maiden ladies, by the name of Beard, who have lived as in a state of great, if not of abject poverty, recently died in Massachusetts, within a few days of each other, and since their decease it has been ascertained, that they were in possession of over five thousand dollars worth of property.

It is now the fashion in Kentucky of the "old folks" to refuse their consent to all would-be sons-in-law. This is not, because they have any real objections to the girl, but because they are too stingy to give a wedding party. They know that a runaway match will be the next thing to a refusal.

We made a note in December last of a beautiful and extraordinary Meteor, whose light we witnessed in the heavens. We now perceive in the English papers an account of a meteor seen in England on the same evening. It was of a blood red color, of great brilliancy, and traversed the heavens from north to west, which was about the appearance and direction of flight of the one we saw. Its appearance terrified a great many people in England.

President Buchanan transmitted to Congress last week a message on the arrest of Gen'l Walker in Nicaragua, Gen. Paulding. He bears witness to the good intentions and gallantry of the Commodore, but considers the act as exceeding destructions, a grave error, and in violation of law. But as Nicaragua is not and will not complain, she has sustained no injustice by the act of Gen. Paulding. The President strongly commends the acts and intentions of Gen. Walker, and those who act with him. While the northern Senators and Members generally still sustain the President's policy in relation to the filibusters, many from the South oppose it.

From Kansas. The latest accounts from this mixed-up and unpeaceable Territory are that the free-state men had determined to take part in the election of the 4th January, and finally accept the Leecompton constitution, relying on their power to change it soon afterwards.

It is also said that upwards of seven thousand votes were polled on the 21st ult., for the Leecompton Constitution, which are believed to be a majority of the whole number of votes in Kansas. If so, the latter are opposed, and the Leecompton Constitution stands as the work of a majority of the voters of that Territory, who have a right to terminate the institutions under which they will live.

We still believe that the "Kansas difficulties" are rapidly approaching a final settlement, and that too without occasioning the "split" in the Democratic party our opponents so earnestly hope for.

At their Old Tricks. It is remembered distinctly by the people of Pennsylvania that Gov. Johnston a few months before the expiration of his term of office issued his flaming proclamation, announcing the "discharge and final extinguishment" of several hundred thousand dollars of the state debt, by the operations of his wonderful sinking fund. In his electioneering speeches the Governor boasted he had paid off so and so much of the state debt. Notwithstanding all this, Gov. Digler was scarcely warm in his seat, when he was obliged to sign a bill creating a loan of \$400,000 for the payment of debts created and left unpaid by the administration of Gov. Johnston. These are facts which cannot be denied. They left unpaid all their obligations that could be avoided, plucking the money in the Sinking Fund for the purpose of deceiving and blinding the people for electioneering purposes.

By reference to Gov. Digler's Message, which we publish to-day, it will be seen that he boasts in the same high-falootin strain of his wonderful achievements in the payment of the State Debt. We should feel highly obliged if you would send us a copy of the Message, so that we may see that it is so. The arguments of the opposition strengthen our faith. If one of the first acts of Gov. Digler's administration will not be the raising of money to pay off the debt created and left unpaid by Gov. Johnston, we shall be gratified and disappointed.

In connection with the boasts of Gov. Digler, and his reduction of the State Debt it may also be remembered that the purchase money realized from the sale of the Main Line of the public works is a considerable item. It makes no mention of that. A few weeks will show how Gov. Digler's apples will.

Pennsylvania Legislature. Both Houses of the Pennsylvania Legislature met on Tuesday. William H. Welsh, (Democrat) was elected Speaker on the 1st ballot. Gen. Wm. H. Miller, of Harrisburg, was elected Chief Clerk. The other officers were as follows--Asst. Clerk, F. M. Hutchinson, of Philadelphia; Transcribers, J. Simpson, of Harrisburg, Jesse B. Davis, of Montgomery, and Nelson Water of Lehigh; Sergeant at Arms, Thos. Snyder, of Blain; Asst. William P. Brady, of Clifton; Doorkeeper, Lewis Frank, of Berks; Asst. Samuel D. Drobot, of Luzerne, and John Farrell, of Philadelphia; Messenger, A. C. Witherspoon, of Bucks; Assistant, David L. Spear, of Fayette.

In the House, A. Brower Longaker, (Democrat) of Montgomery, was elected Speaker on the first ballot, receiving 77 votes. Clark Ziegler, of Butler county, was re-elected. Joseph W. Dutton, of Berks, was re-elected. The rest of the officers are as follows--Doorkeeper, Samuel Taylor, of Carbon; Messenger, John Smith, of Armstrong; Postmaster, John Smith, of Fayette.

Both Houses, on Wednesday, adjourned to Monday of this week.

Messrs. C. B. Forney, S. Reinhold, and T. Foster, have purchased a property known as the "Estate of Samuel Mifflin, Jr.," located in North Lebanon borough, for \$7,000. It is the intention to sell it out in an early day. They were pleased to hear of this arrangement, as the property named has for years been a great impediment to the improvement of the borough. We do not doubt but there will be a ready sale for the lots, and that next summer will be a busy building time on them.

George M. Leaman presented a petition last week to the Supreme Court, praying for an injunction to prevent the consolidation of the Reading and Lebanon Valley Railroads. The Court permitted the election yesterday to proceed, but directed that the certificate thereof should not be filed with the Secretary of the Commonwealth until further orders. Some time will now probably elapse before the consolidation is effected, if at all. It is contended that the act of consolidation is unconstitutional.

On Saturday evening, shortly after the meeting of Court, and when the room was crowded almost to its utmost capacity, the gas suddenly failed, enveloped the room in darkness. With the exception of slight stamping the best order prevailed. The failure of gas was occasioned by the want of water in the motor. In less than five minutes the defect was remedied, and business proceeded. It would be well to keep a supply of candles or other lighting material, ready for such emergencies in all public buildings, as there is no telling what might happen if a panic were to seize the crowd in the darkness and uncertainty.

L. V. R. On Monday next, the Lebanon Valley Railroad will open for public travel between Reading and Harrisburg. The passenger cars will arrive at Harrisburg at 12.50 noon, in time for all the other trains. Returning Leabanon arrive at 2.45 p. m. Fare between Leabanon and Harrisburg 75 and 60 cents.

Court was in session all last week, and on Monday of this. The following business was transacted, viz: Oyer and Terminer. Com. vs. James McNeal and Samuel McEachen--Robbery. Not guilty. Com. vs. Thomas Hughes--Rape. Guilty--Sentenced to solitary confinement in the Penitentiary for nine years and nine months. The criminal in this case is a mulatto, aged about 24 years. The victim of his lawless young white girl, about 15 years of age. Hughes met her on the road, and made the attack upon her. There was a very deep feeling against the prisoner, and his life is much safer in the penitentiary than it would be in his locality.

Common Pleas. John Henry vs. Jacob Garman--Assumpsit--Judgment for Plaintiff for \$467.07. P. McAdams vs. John H. Osborne--Assumpsit. Verdict for Plaintiff for \$3012. Elizabeth Lepp vs. Peter H. Kapp--Breach of Promise of Marriage. Verdict for Plaintiff for \$750.

In all the above cases motions for new trials were made. The arguments will be heard at the next Court.
