All good coins at their respective value, for debts of any amount above five dollars, dimo, and half dime, at their respective values, for debt of any amount under five dollars.under thirty cents; and 4th, by the law passed at the last session of Congress, we may add, onecont pieces for any amount under ten cents. By the law of Congress, passed some four or five years ago, gold, was made the legal tender for large smounts. Injunction against an Insurance Conpany.-Judge Jones has granted a preliminary injunction to restrain the Managers of the Mutual Fire Insurance Company of Sinking Spring from collecting the assessment of \$1 per \$1000 insured, recently levied upon the members, and the payment of which was to be made during the last week of the past month; and first two weeks of March.

The injunction has been granted upon the application of Mr. John Adam Scheetz, of Womelsdorf, a member of the Company, upon the ground as he alleges, that the available funds of the Company are sufficient to meet all the present demands upon it, and that the assessment has been made in violation of its charter.


