FLOUR.—The Flour market is if anything a little firmer, but the imports are liberal, and the demand for export limited; sales, however, to the extent of 1000 barrels extra, are reported at \$6:700 barrels extra fancy at \$6 25, and 700 barrels do and better brands at \$7 50 33 barrel; standard brands are offered at \$5 871 @5 50 B barrel, the latter for strult superfine, without finding buyers to any extent at these rates; the home trade are buying moderately within the above range of prices, and fancy brands at \$6.75@7 \$ barrel. Nothing doing in Rye Flour or Corn Most, and prices are steady at \$ \$ barrel. The transactions of Flour and Meal for the week were 23,241 barrels.

GRAIN .- The market is poorly supplied with wheat, and prime lots are wanted at higher prices. Sales include some 2,000 bushels, in lots: mostly reds, at \$1 30@1 33, chiefly at the latter rate for choice Southern, and some fine white at \$1 40. Rye is better and 500 bushels sold at 80c. Corn is more abundant and the demand is limi ted, with sales of 2500 bushels of yelloy, in lots, at 95@94c, closing with more sellers than buyers at the latter rate. Outs are unchanged, and about 2000 bushels sold at 43@43 te. the latter for very prime; old Oats are worth 50c.

PHILADELPHIA CATTLE MARKET.-The receipts of Beef Cattle show a considerable fulling off at the different yards during the past week, amounting in all to about 1600 head. The market was lively, and prices 25@50 cts. the 100 lbs. better than last Monday evening, at from-\$6 to \$7 the 100 lbs. for common quality.
