It will be seen by the following sections of the law referred to, that any person who is found violating any of its provisions is liable to pay a fine of rive DOLLARS for each and

32. That from and after the passage of this act, no person shall shoot, kill or otherwise destroy any pheasant between the first day of January and the first day of September, or any woodcock between the first day of January and the fourth day of This. or any narridge or raphit between the first day of January and the fourth day of This. or any narridge or raphit between day of July, or any partridge or rabbit between the first day of January and the first day of October, in the present year and in each and every year thereafter, under the penalty of five dollars

for each and every effence.

23. That no person shall buy or cause to be bought, or carry out of this State, for the purpose of supplying any private or public house or market any phesent partidge, waddenck or rabbit. ket, any pheasant, partridge, woodcock orrabbit, nuless the same shall have been shot or taken in the proper season as provided for in this act under a penalty of five dollars for each and every

offence.

## CALIFORNIA JOTTINGS.

The Sacramento Bce tells of a California faritier who made his fortune in one year. The lucky individual was Isade Lancaster, who, about a year ago, bought 300 acres of land in Napa county, at the rate of \$5 per acre. He at once put in a crop of wheat, and about January, 1858, went to the Atlantic States to see his family, leaving the wheat to take care of itself. When he returned his crop was almost ripe, and in June he hervested over ten thousand bushels of the handsomest wheat, probably, ever grown in California; most of which he sold for 4 cents per pound, the choicest portion bringing 4 cents .-A few weeks ago he sold one-half of his rauche at \$35 per acre, receiving therefor \$3700 more than he paid for it one year ago, in addition to which his wheat crop notted him over expenses, the enormous sum of \$25,000, so that his net profits in twelve months, not including his rancho, worth \$5000, were over \$29,000.

GRAIN .- In Wheat there is but little doing, and about 1200 bushels sold at \$1 24@1 26 for reds, and \$1 35@1 40c for white, the latter for good Penna. Rye is wanted, and 600 bushels Delaware brought 80c, which is in an advance.-Corn is wanted, and a few small lots dry yellow have been picked up at 70c, at which rate it is scarce; some white sold at 86c.
