These itinerants attend all the fairs, and carry with them not. only money, but ribbons, prachhack pine, and other articles of fehiltline finery, sure to tangle girls eyes. Never turn up your nose in contempt at red hair spain ! It sells for more and brings. more than any other hair; a head that gives frequent crops of this color is the source of a fortune to the lucky possessor. The market value of hair is as follows: red, black, brown, blonde. 


