The Ladies' shoe makers of Philadelphia had a strike last week. It censed in a few days, as the principal dealers agreed to pay the prices demanded. A national organization of the journeymen has been commenced, and branch societies exist in Baltimore, Pittsburg, and other places. A National Grand Council has been formed of delegates from the subordinate sociaties. The strike in that city was to establish a uniform rate of prices, and an advance of .about six per cent, on some shops, and ten or twelve on others, according to quality of the work. At the time of the panic, the wages were reduced twenty per cent, on all kinds of work. Last spring the price was restored, by a number of the heaviest employers giving the twenty per cent, taken off. Even at these prices, the men allege that, with 12 and 14 hours labor per day, they cannot average more than from \$6 to \$7 per week each, and they ask an advance of less than a dollar a week. There are 1700 employed in the manufacturing shops of that city, on this branch, and of this number 1300 are members of the Association, and participating in the strike, These who have obtained the advance have continued to work. A large number of German shoemakers are concerned in the movement.
