The 1st of April is come and gone, and many of the debts that should have been paid remain unpaid. It is never too late, however, to do good, and the large bulk of creditors who did not receive their dues on the 1st, will no doubt yet feel glad to handle the "ding-bats." Some people say that money "was scarce;" others say it was only "middling;" while others again, who had pleaty of it, gleefully asserted that "it was abundant." We, individually and collectively, vote it 'rayther scarce,' and, as a journalist is supposed to know a good deal, and freely say what he knows, we venture to account for the scarcity as follows :- A large number of folks who had money to loan held it back with the expectation of obtaining a large percent therefor-say eight, ten or twelve per cent., which is indirectly allowed by a law passed last winter by the Legislature. Others, again, decline to loan money in this state on account of the heavy state tax they are obliged to pay thereon, preferring to invest it in United State Stocks, or other securities not subject to our taxation laws. If these are some of the reasons for the scarcity of money, the question arises whether our laws are not more pernicious than beneficial to the public, and if the former, if they had not better be repealed. Laws are instited for the public benefit and security, but we question the beneficial effects of the laws taxing money at interest. It may be right enough in many instances, but it is wrong and useless in a majority cases? The capital that should circulate among us, is taken away, and others have the benefit of it. And again, the amount that is received in the State Treasury is but a small item -In the aggregate, and will be less every year hereafter while the law taxing many at interest remains unrepealed, and might very easily be made up by a little stricter economy in State expendi-
