SMOKE FOR WOUNDS .- A correspondent of the Country Gentleman, mentions a case of a horse, which was just ready to die of an old and festered wound. Fortunately, he adds, at this stage of the case, an old Pennsylvania teamster came to relief and recommended smoking with old shoes. The smoke was made of old shoes, soles and all, cut in pieces, in a hog trough, and placed under the swollen parts. In a few hours the swelling subsided, and the sore commenced discharging matter; the horse was saved.

FLOUR .- There is but little or no expor emand for Flour, and the market is unsettled the sales being only to supply the trade at from \$6.121 @6.50 for superfine and extras, and \$6.75 @7 Bearrel for extra family and fancy lots, according to quality, holders generally being anxious sellers at these rates. Of Rye Flour a sale of 100 barrels was made at \$425 B barrel. Corn Meal is quiet, but steady and firm at \$3 871 B barrel for Pennsylvania.
