Pickled Eggs.—At this season of the year when eggs are plentiful, boil some four or six dozen in a capacious saucepan, until hey become quite hard. Then, after carefully removing the shells, lay them in large-mouthed jars, and pour over them scalding vincgar, well seasoned with whole pepper, alspice, a few races of ginger, and a few cloves of garlic. When cold, bung down closely, and in a month they are fit for use. Where eggs are plentiful, the above pickle is by no means expensive.

Domestic Ginger Beer.-Two gallons of ginger beer may be made as follows : -Put two gallons of cold water into a pot, upon the fire; add to it two ounces of good ginger, and two pounds of white or brown sugar. Let all this come to the boil, and continue boiling for half an hour. Then skim the liquor, and pour it into a jar or tub, along with one sliced lemon and half an ounce of cream of tartar. When nearly cold, put in a teacupful of yeast to cause the liquor to work. The beer is now made ; and after it has worked for two days strain it and bottle for use. Tie the corks down firmly.

DREADFUL ACCIDENT.-At the steam tannery of Diller & Arndt, in Jonestown, a terrible accident occurred on last Friday morning. A man named Sattezahn brought some bark to the tannery. He was accompanied by a boy, aged about 13 years, named George Shriver, son of Dr. Shriver, dec'd., residing in Union township, near the second mountain. While Mr. Satterahn and the men of the tannery, were engaged, the boy accidently fell into a vat of boiling liquor.
