CHEAP FURNITURE. Many persons who have purchased cheap chairs in Philadelphia, have been somewhat astonished at the facility with which they broke or fell to pieces when put to use, or exposed to the genial warmth of a coal stove. A peep at the minutie of manufacturing them will explain the why and wherefore of the frailty complained of. A large portion of the turned part of Windsor chairs is manufactured in New Jersey, and as a gentleman said who is largely engaged in the business, any kind of wood is used, that is not fit for any other purpose; a slight sprinkling of maple being put in, to swear by. The wood is cut into the proper size by circular saws, and then turned, always working it green; all the turning and boring is done by machinery, and so expert have the manufacturers become in the business, that a complete set of pieces necessary for a chair, thirteen in number, (back and sent excepted,) is delivered in Philadelphia for 82 dants per set, while the actual cost of manual labor per set is only 31 cents. There is not much export demand for Flour, but under the light receipts and a good city demand, the market continues very firm. Bye. Flour and Corn Meal are steady. Wheat is held, firmly at the advance realized in the early part of the week, the receipts are light, and demand fair. Rye is wanted for distilling, there is very little coming forward, and all that arrives is readly taken at our quotations. Corn declined 2 to 3 cts. per-bushel since our last, the market is abundantly supplied, but to-day the demand is better. Oats are dull—Clover Seed is lower; and sales are mostly to supply the retail trade, the export demand has entirely ceased.—Timothy and Flax Seed areals, good demand. Whistey is firm at our quotations. Plaster has advanced considerably, the stook being in the hands of a few, parties, and very light. The weather is mild and pleasant, and favorable to business. We quote:
