How to Krep Furs.—A few days more, and furs will be superfluous. Then comes the process of so putting them away that moths shall not invade them. The same thing is necessary to protest woolens, the moth being no respecter of anything in the line. The best way to insure immunity from destruction is to pack all in a trunk or box lined with brown holland. first sprinkling them liberally with black pepper. This is better even than camphor, for dealers in furs are often victimized by entomological pests, though their goods be saturated with this powerful odor. Before packing away, furs should be well beaten, to dislodge any larves that, despite the most surupulous care, may be deposited in them. The superiority of pepper over camphor. as a preservative to furs consists in the fact that, while larves will incubate among camphor, there

The Flour market has been very firm during the week, and at the close we have to notice some export, and a fair home consumption demand; the receipts though greater than the week previous are not heavy, amounting to only 14,000 bils. The supply of Wheat has been very limited, and transactions correspondingly light; there has been an advance of five cents per, bushel over last week's prices, and the market closes firm at the advance. Rye meets with a ready sale, and Corn is firm. Outs are steady, sales are mostly at the railroad; a few cargoes of Southern have been sold during the week. Clover seed has been gradually declining for several days, and the market closes dull, with only a small retail demand. We have advices from Liverpool; stating that the "market is glutted, and no buyers." Flax seed is firm. Timothy seed has again advanced, and is in demand. Rye flour is not blenty, and the demand good. Orn Meal is quiet. We quote:


