DOINGS IN WASHINGTON.

On Monday, March 25, the Senate passed the Pacific telegraph bill, the consular and diplomatic appropriation bill the bill for the sale of arms to the States and Territories, and the resoutions from the House for the relief of mail contractors. In the House a number of bills and resolutions were introduced. Among the former was one by Mr. Blake, of Ohio, for the repeal of the fugitive slave law, and another by Mr. Da rnett, of Va, to enable citizens to take their p roperty of every kind into the Tirritory of Kansas. But the chief point of interest in the whole proceedings was a resolution of Mr. Blake, (Republican, from Ohio,) instructing the judiciary Comm litee to bring in a bill for the abolition and nterdict ion of slavery wherever Congress has power over the subject. Mr. Blake's Regubli-can associates were manifest by taken by surprise by the movement, and saught by every possible means to avoid a vote, but it was forced upon them by the minority. The resolution was lest by a vote of 109 to: 60, and among that sixty stand all the Republican leaders of the House. Mr. Killinger and a number of his Republican associates from Pennsylvania "dedged;" while Morris, Millward, Hickman, and Schwartz were frightened into the "hays," It was a scene of great confusion in the House, but greater tribulation to the members who were thus compelled

o meet the issue. 
