ASPARAGUS BEDS .- They should receive early attention. As soon as the soil is dry enough to work they should be spaded up. mixing in as much fine manure as possible. A fork is better than a spade for this purpose, as less liable to cut the roots. As the plant is a pative of the seashore an occasional dressing of salt assists it materially; enough sprinkled over the bed to make it look white will not endanger the plant.

Prof. J. H.
