A CAUTION TO TRAVELERS .- Many persons, in passing from one car to another, while a train is in motion, are accustomed to steady themselves by grasping the horizontal wheel used for winding up the brake, which projects above the railing on the platform of the car. This habit has now become an extremely danger ous one. Several of the leading railroads are beginning to use a new kind of brake, which, in case of emergency, can be set almost instantly without the presence of the brakesman. Should duck an emergency arise while a passenger was iteadying himself by one of the wheels, it would without the least warning, commence to revolve rapidly, and he would lose his hold and run great risk of falting between the cars. This is felt to be so real a danger that the latest patterns for the wheels are made with webs in them, rendering it impossible for the hand completely to encircle the iron of the wheel. This, however, but slightly obviates the danger. A careful man will shun them entirely.

The Tulpehocken and Swatara Railroad, for which a charter was granted by the last Legislature is designed to commence by connecting with the Lebanon Valley Railroad at Womeledorf, in Berks county, and from thence in a direct and feasible route to Pinegrove and Tremont, in Schuylkill county. The object purposed is to tunnel the Blue Mountain. They are two depressions or narrow passes in this mountain .-One where the road from Pinegrove crosses to Millersburg, and the other where the road crosses from Pinegrove to Lebanon. Which of these will be the shortest route for the tunnel, must be determined by actual and careful survey. It is believed that the length of the tunnel cannot exseed thirteen hundred vards, and may not be over eleven hundred. South of the Blue Mountain the road is to branch; one branch leading off the trade from Pinegrove to Womelsdorf, and the other in a direct and judicious route to Lebanon It is believed that connections can be made with railroads already made at or near Pinegrove, which will insure a complete route to Tramont and all the important coal operations upon the Swatara and its tributaries.

The distance from Pinegrove to Womelsdor will probably be from 18 to 19 miles, and from Pinegrove to Lebanon 16 or 17 miles. The whole distance of the line including both branches, will be from 30 to 32 miles.
