PHILADELPHIA, June 18, 1860 FLOUR:—The Flour market is very dull, and prices rule somewhat irregularly. Mixed and good brands of superine are affered at \$5 25 \$8 barret, but the only sales are in a small way for home consumption, and extra and fancy—brands from \$5 37 up to \$7—according to quality.—The receipts are small; but fully ample for the demand, as there is no inquiry for shipment.—Rye Flour is held, at \$3 87 and Corn Meal at \$3 37 @ barret, but without sales.

GRAIN.—The demand for Wheat is very limited at the late decline. Sales of 1,000 bushels prime Southern red at \$1 35; 600 bushels good Pennsylvania, red at \$1 36; 500 bushels good white at \$1 30, and 1,000 bushels good ditto at \$1 40 \$9 bushel. Rye is dull at 78 \$80 cents—Corn of prime quality is scarce and in demand at 68 cents aftoat; some inferior sold at 60 @65 cts, Oats are steady at 43 cents for Pennsylvania and 40 cents for Delaware.
