Cattle which pick a pasture down to the bone, nearly always run largely to bone. John Johnston supposes a case, founded on repeated observation, in illustration of this truth. He says : "A. has a field which he thinks will keep twenty cattle, and he puts them into it. B. has a field of the same size and quality, but he puts only ten cattle into it. Now it will almost always be found that in the autumn, the ten have gained as many, often more pounds live weight, than the twenty. The 10 with first 'rate pas-ture should gain 400 pounds each, and it is doubtful if the 20 would have gained 200 pounds each.
