EARTHQUAKES, AND GOLD ACCOUNTED For.—A paper, on "subterranean movements," by Professor Vaughan, of Cincinnati, was read before the British Association for the Advancement of Science, at its last meeting. The Professor stated that the amount of heat supposed to have escaped from our planet during the past ages called into existence greater forces than those indicated by the upheaval of our mountain ranges or the existence of earthquakes. The solidiying of the igneous rocks from a fluid state would necessarily produce paroxysms, and, being dependent on gases for stability, the Earth's crust would in different parls extend a depth into the lava proportionate to the elevation on the surface. Inequalities in the crust of the globe, as indicated by local forces of gravity, and disturbences of the pendulum, showed that the inner side was irregular, that our continents rest was irregular, that our continents rest on the bases of subterranean mountains. whose tops might be depressed three or four hundred miles beneath the level of the rectified matter. As the solid matter on the internal mountains must ultimately be crushed by the extreme pressure, a mighty avalanche of rock would continually tumble on the thinner part of the Earth's crust. which would be imperceptible on mountains and continents, but on adjacent coasts and islands would produce earthquakes. This movement probably brings the heavy metals from the central to the superficial parts of the Earth, and accounts in some measure for the general appear .ance of gold in quartz rocks.


