CAMP MARY, FORT GOOD HOPE, December 5th; 1861.

EDITOR ADVERTISER:—I accidentally got hold

of a copy of your paper for this week, and was surprised to see that you had no regular camp correspondent in this Regiment. I will endeavor

Of our trip from Lebanon to Washington it is now too late to say much, suffice it that warmstrived at Washington in good time, all safegand sound,—dobody missing—and were entertained over night in the "Soldier's Rest;" a place purposely provided for the new comers. The next mothing after our strival in the city we marched out to Kendall Gress, where we pitched tents, and then soldier's life commenced with us in parness. All hands took to it as naturally as a duck taketate water, so there was very little jar.


