These counterfeiters are printed from the genuine plate of some broken Bank of another State, altered to suit the eye of course, entirely unlike the true issues of the Banks named.

MILL DESTROYED BY FIRE.—The flour mill belonging to Daniel Good, in Conestoga township, between Martintown and Conestoga Centre, Lancaster county, was burned down on Tuesday night of last week, with all its contents including some two or three thousand dollars in money. The mill was in the occupancy of a Mr. Dietrich, who was asleep in a room of the building at the time when the fire broke out, and barely time to make his escape. The fire is supposed to have caught from the stove accidentally. We understand the mill and grain were insured to a considerable amount.

One of the ladies, seeing the danger, threw the youngest child out on the bank, and the horse, plunging into the water, and reared the three-year old child, who was in the spin and eddies of the water, and attempted to pull him to shore, but being too weak for such a task, she was drowned. The dam was raised, and the water, with which the children were frozen close to their bodies, went to a house near by, where they were properly cared for.
