A Condensed Ain Locomotive. - A correspond. ent writing from St. Petersburg says, that on the 16th ult., a new kind of locomotive was tried, with perfect success, on the Nicholai line. The motive power was condensed air, and the trial trip was made to ascertain the adaptibility of the angine in working the line. The inventor is named Baronowski, and the machine consists of a framework, with a reservoir for condensed air, and a number of tubes running above and below it. 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
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
