The 127th Regiment, of which Captain Greenswalt's Company forms a part, took a 'very active part in the late battle at Fredericksburg. We have been able thus far to glean the following list of ensualties to said company, which with one or two slight cases embraces all. Zimmerman, of East Hanover, killed: Adam Carmony, wounded in leg; Uriah Kreider in neck and back : Samuel Peter, jr., of Jonestown, missing; Ed. Bomberger, in hand : John Seltzer, do: Charles F. Patechke, do; John Mutch, in shoulder, dightly; John P. Umberger, in foot; H. Keller, hand; George D. Rise, leg; Isaac Brandt and Henry A. Brown are also wounded, but the character of their injuries we have not learned. John P. Umberger, who is now in one of the Washington Hospitale, laid on the battle field all night. He was removed in an ambulance and he was not sick, but fell sweetly as leep to awaken no more until the morning of the resurthe next morning. Capt. Fox's company, in the same Regiment. and partly recruited in this place, (Mesers. Jomeph Daugherty and D. S. Long, Lieutenants,) were also in the battle, but we have thus far been unable to learn any particulars about them. Capt. Fox was killed on Friday, while crossing the river towards Fredericksburg by a rebel shell. The 127th Regiment was the second that crossed the penteen bridge.

ceased was born on the 10th day of June, A. D. 1787, in this borough, and spent his life time in the place of his birth. When in active life, he published the "Lebanon Marning Star" for 33 years, or the 1 of a century. He was unfliaching in his Democratic principles, both in State and Church, and endesvored to uphold with strict in tegrity the true principles of his constituents.— He served one term in the State Senate, representing the counties of Lebanon and Dauphin.— He was one of the drafted men in 1814, and took his place in the ranks. When his Regiment was his place in the ranks. When his Regiment was about leaving the marching orders were count-ermanded. On the 29th day of September, 1821 ormanded. On the 29th day of September, 1821 he was appointed, under the regulations of the militia of Penna. Quartermaster of the 14th Regiment, first brigade, sixth Division, composed of the militia of the coun ties of Dauphin, Lebanon, Berks and Schuylkill. On the 23d of February, 1824, Juo. A. Shultz, Governor of Pennsylvania, appointed him Lieutenant of the fifth company of the above named Brigade. In the year 1830, he was elected as a State Senator of Pennsylvania, representing the counties of of Pennsylvania, representing the counties of Lebanon and Dauphin. On the 14th day of December, 1835, Governor Wolf appointed him.a Justice of the Pence, in the district composed of the Borough and Township of Lebanon. As a Christian he was unwavering in his attachment to his Church and maintained a conduct in sup-port of his faith in the crucified Redeemer, which was his firm relience to the end of his life. He ever expressing himself in the strongest hope to realise a blessed immortality beyond the grave. Under all his trials, he bore them with content ment. His decease was an affection of the heart, terminating in dropsy. His sufferings were in-tense until about 48 hours before he died. He


