Gen. John Weidman, died on Thursday morning, in this place, aged 48 years 2 months and 24 days. He leaves a widow and three children. He was a member of the 69th, and a faithful husband and kind father. He was interred on Monday morning in Zion's Lutheran Cemetery, followed by a large concourse of mourning friends.

Mr. Weidman, although in years in the prime of life, had been for a long period of time one of the most prominent citizens of this place, and a distinguished member of the Legislature of the State. He had been a lawyer and a Democratic politician. He had a kind heart and a genial disposition, and was respected and loved by all who knew him. He never held any public position of prominence, except that of District Attorney, which he held for several years, and during which his personal popularity, when every other man on the ticket with him was defeated. Before the expiration of his term, office the rebellion broke out, when he volunteered for three years of the Cavalry Company for three years of the year. He accompanied his Company to Washington and participated in the battles of Bull Run, Antietam, and Gettysburg, and he was in Maryland. After a service upwards of a year he contracted the disease which obliged him to resign and caused his death. While on the Peninsula he was severely wounded by a shell which struck him near his head, and he lay for many days in a hospital, and he was taken to his home in Lebanon, Pa., where he died.

How to DETECT COUNTERFEIT POSTAL CHECKS.—It is said that there are bogus fifty-cent postal notes in circulation. They may be detected by the following means:—First, the color of the notes, which should be a bright yellow. Second, the watermark, which should be a portrait of George Washington. Third, the texture of the paper, which should be a heavy, fibrous paper. Fourth, the size of the notes, which should be 3 1/2 inches by 6 1/2 inches. Fifth, the date of issue, which should be within six months of the date of the issue.
