The Philadelphia Market. SATURDAY EVENING, July 18, 1863. FLOUR-There is very little demand, and the parket continues dull. 100 bbls superfine sold

at \$5 50; 300 bbls Ohio family at \$5 30@6 50; and 300 bbls City Mills extra at \$6 50 per bbl. The trade are buying in small lots at \$5.50 for superfine; \$6@6.50 for extra; \$6.25@6.75 for extra family, and \$7@8 per bbls for funcy brands according to quality. Rye flour is dull at \$4 50 @475 per bbl. In Corn meal there is very lit tle deing. Small sales of Pennsylvania are making at \$4, and Brandywine at \$3 25 per bbl. GRAIN.—There is very little demand for Wheat, and prices are unchanged. Small sales of Pennsylvania red are making at \$1 40@1 45, and white at \$1 50@1 55 P bush. Rye is selling at \$1 05 P bushel for Pennsylvauia. Corn is very dull; about 1,000 bushels of prime yellow sold at 86c, and Western mixed at 81@82c B bush. Oats are without change; 2,500 bush Pennsylvania sold at 78@80c, and 400 bushels Delaware at 7Sc. weight.

CATTLE MARKET .- The receipts of Beef CATTLE MARKET.—The receipts of Beef Cattle were very large again this week, reaching about 4650 head, and the market generally very dull at previous quotations. Of this number some 3000 were taken by the government at from \$5 37½ to 5 80 the 100 lbs. gross, and the balance sold to the butchers, at \$8 to \$11½ the 100 lbs., as to quality. Cows—About 100 were disposed of at from \$20 to \$35 each for Springers, and \$20 to \$40 for cows and calves, as to condition, which is a decline. Hogs were also rather lower and about 2350 sold, including 1603 at Glass' Union Drove Yard, at \$7 to \$8, and 720 at the Avenue at from \$6 50 to \$3 25 the 100 bs. net. Sheep continue in steady demand, and about 6000 sold at 5@5\frac{1}{2} c \bar{2} b, gross. Lambs ranged at \$2@4\frac{1}{2} each, as to condition.

A Joint Resolution PROPOSING CERTAIN AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

Deta Resolved by the Senate and House of Representiatives of the State of Pennsylvania in General Assembly med, 'That the following amendments be proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the tenth article thereof:

There shall be an additional section to the third article of the Constitution, to be designated as section four, as follows: ticle of the Constitution, to be designated as section four, as follows:

- Secrow 4. Whenever any of the qualified electors of this Commonwealth shall be in any actual military service, under a requisition from the President of the United States, or by the authority of this Commonwealth, such electors may exercise the right of suffrage in all elections by the citizens, under such regulations as arc, or shall be, prescribed by laws, as fully as if they were present at their usual place of election.

There shall be two additional sections to the eleventh article of the Constitution, to be designated as sections eight and nine, as follows:

Section S. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature containing more than one subject, which shall be containing more than one subject, which shall be clearly expressed in the title, except appropriation
