On motion Col. Zambach was elected President, and Major Stein, Secretary. On motion a Committee of one from each County, including the Staff Officers, was appointed to draft resolutions expressive of the sense of the meeting as follows:—Col. Embick, Major Stein, Deits, Schultz and Biggishaus, Capt. Reinhold, W. Schmitz, Stamm, and J. W. Harbeson.

On motion the following was adopted:—Resolved, That the undersigned do hereby petition the Hon. J. B. Embick, A. M., on the parade ground. JOHN B. EMBICK, President. J. J. Strutz, Secretary.

CAMP MULLENBERG. READING, July 25th, 1883. Agreeably to adjournment, a meeting of all companies from Lebanon County, was held on the parade grounds, where the following preamble and resolutions were read and unanimously adopted:—

Whereas, At a meeting of the citizens of Lebanon, held at the Court House on the 20th day of June, 1883, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:—

Resolved, That the loyalty of the public danger, and the safety of the State are imperiled by the whole population of the State able to bear arms, to rise in self defense, an immediate and universal response to this call will enable us to meet our situation as men of courage and patriotism—a reputation which we are free to acknowledge, has been improved by our hesitating response to the call for volunteers by the public authorities, the danger to our safety and honor appeared not likely to be realized—save our own homes from plunder and devastation, and teach the enemy a lesson they may have cause to remember.

Resolved, That the County Commissioners, be and they are hereby instructed to borrow immediately, and as occasion may require upon the credit of the County, such amount of money as may be sufficient to pay to every man who may desire payment the sum of three dollars per week while he is thus engaged in the public service, and that the County Commissioners be and they are hereby instructed to indemnify, and save harmless the said Commissioners in borrowing the said money required as above stated.

Resolved, That in view of the truth of the above preamble and resolution, and on account of the "imminence of the public danger," seven companies from Lebanon county promptly responded to the call of the volunteers, to save our (their) own homes from plunder and devastation.

Resolved, That we heard with regret that the rank and file of the volunteers to pay each and every man from the County, a weekly bounty of three dollars, has not been carried out; we now declare that as we relied upon the promise of the County Commissioners to pay each and every man who would forgo his home and family to fight for his country, we respectfully request such provisions as existing remains remain.

Resolved, That a number of the men composing the 48th Regiment have left their families all day, and night, and in the "imminence of the public danger," and the safety of the State, and the rescue of their invaded States, and from letters daily received from home we are pained to learn that many of our families are destitute of the necessities of life, and consequently dependent upon the liberal bounty.

Resolved, That we consider the proceedings of our friends at home disgraceful, and as soldiers we call upon them to perform their duty as citizens, and to contribute to the relief of our men on the field.
