Agreeably to adjournment, a meeting of all companies from Lebanou county was held on the parade grounds, when the following preamble and resolutions were read and unan imously adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of the citizens of Leba-non-county, held at the Court House on the bor-ough of Lebanon; on Monday the 22th day of June, 1863, the following preamble and resolu-tion were adopted:—

WHEREAS, The imminency of the public danger all will admit, now calls in thonder tones upon the whole population of the State able to bear rms, to rise in self defense, an immediate and universal response by our people to this call will enable us to redeem our reputation as men of courage and patriotism—a reputation which we are free to acknowledge has been imperilled by our hesitating response to the call for volunteers by the public authorities when the danger seem ed remote and appeared not likely to be realized --- save our own homes from plunder and devasta-

tion, and teach the enemy a lesson they may have occasion long to remember.

Resolved, That the County Commissioners, be and they are bereby instructed to borrow immediately, and as occasion may require upon the credit of the county, such sums of money as may be suffi-cient to pay to every man who who may desire pay-ment the sum of three dollars per week while he is thus engaged in the public service, and that this meeting does hereby collectively pleage itself to indemnify, and save barmless the said Commissioners in borrowing the said monies required a

above stated. Therefore, Resolved, That in view of the truth Therefore, Resolved, That in view of the truth of the above preamble and resolution, and on account of the "imminency of the public danger," seven companies from Lebanon county promptly responded to the call of the Governor, to "save our (their) own homes from plunder and devasta-

Resolved, That we heard with regret that the Resolved, That we neard with regret that the resolution authorizing the Commissioners to pay each and every man from the county, a weekly bounty of three dollars, has not been carried out; we now declare that as we relied upon the prom ise or pledge then and there made, and by their refusal or delay to pay to those who went furth to defend their homes and fires ides their just bounty,

we respectfully recommend for such PATRIOTS an everlasting remembrance.

Resolved. That a number of the men composng the 48th Regiment have left their families almost destitute, and "like men of courage," come to the receive of their invaded State, and from letters daily received from home we are pained to learn that many of our families are destitute of the necessaries of life, and consequently dependent upon the like of the second state of the second state of the second state of the second seco nt upon the liberal few. of Sile McCool.

of our friends at home disgraceful, and as soldiers we call upon them to perform their duty and regain that confidence reposed in them previ ous to our leaving for the "tented field." On motion adjourned.

A Joint Resolution

PROPOSING CERTAIN AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

Dett Resolved by the Senate and House of Represenditures of the State of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met. That the following amendments be proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the tenth article thereof:

There shall be an additional section to the third, article of the Constitution, to be designated as section four, as follows:

Section 4. Whenever any of the qualified electors of this Commonwealth shall be in any actual milliary service, under a requisition from the President of the United States, or by the authority of this Commonwealth shall be in any actual milliary service, under a requisition from the President of the United States, or by the authority of this Commonwealth, such electors may exercise the right of suffrage in all elections by the citizeng-ander such regulations as are, or shall be, prescribed by laws, as fully as if they were present at their usual place of election. There shall be two additional sections to the eleventh article of the Constitution, to be designated as sections eight and nine, as follows:

Section 8. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature of the Section 9. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature Section 9. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature clearly expressor in bills.

Section 9. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature granting any powers, or privileges that has been or may hereafter be, conferred upon the courts of this Commonwealth.
