ticle of the Constitution, to be designated as section four, as follows:

Szcrox 4. Whenever any of the qualified electors of this Commonwealth shall be in any actual military service, under a requisition from the Président of the United States, or by the authority of this Commonwealth, such electors may exercise the right of suffrage in all elections by the citizens, under such regulations as arc, or shall be, prescribed by laws, as fully as if they were present at their usual place of election.

There shall be two add thomal sections to the eleventh article of the Constitution, to be designated as sections eight and nine, as follows:

Szcrox 8. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature contribing more than one subject, which shall be clearly expressed in the title, except appropriation bills.
