A Joint Resolution PROPOSING CERTAIN AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

Be it Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Stidle of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met. That the following amendments be proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the tenth article thereof:

There shall be an additional section to the third article of the Constitution; to be designated as section four, as follows:

Section 4. Whenever any of the qualified electors of this Commonwealth shall be in any actual military service, under a requisitive from the President of the United States, or by the authority of this Commonwealth, such electors may exercise the right of suffrage in all elections by the citizens, under such regulations as are, or shall be, prescribed by laws, as fully as if they were present at their usual place of election.
