A Joint Resolution PROPOSING CERTAIN AMENDMENTS TO

THE CONSTITUTION.

Deit Resolved by the Senate and House of Represending the State of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met. That the following amendments be proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the tenth article thereof:

There shall be an additional section to the third article of the Constitution, to be designated as section four, as follows: ticle of the Constitution, to be designated as section four, as follows:

SECTION 4. Whenever any of the qualified electors of this Commonwealth shall be in any actual military service, under a requisition from the President of the United States, or by the authority of this Common wealth, such electors may exercise the right of suffrage in all elections by the critizens, under such regulation as are, or shall be, prescribed by laws, as fully as stay of the war of the war of the war of the constitution and the eleventh article of the Constitution, to be designated as sections eight and nine, as follows:

SECTION 8. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature containing more than one subject, which shall be clearly expressed in the title, except appropriation bills.

SECTION 9. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature granting any powers, or privileges that has been, or may hereafter be, conferred upon the courts of this Commonwealth.
