THE FORESTURE OF COTTON—WHO GETS THE LAON'S SHARE - A great deal of cotton is siezed in the Southwest and sold ostensibly for the Government, but one or two sales recently reported, amounting in gross to \$60,513, the amount realized to the Government was but \$26,919. 
