By a law pased by the last Legislature, the abatement of five per cent on the amount of State taxes, paid fifteen days prior to the first of September, in any year, is repealed; and, hereafter, it shall be the duty of the auditor general to add five per centum penalty to each county all State taxes remaining unpaid, on the first day of August, which shall be charged in the duplicate, against each delinquent tax payers in arrears, on and after said day.
