Sir:—Yours of the 9th inst is received. The question as to who shall pay the duty required on receipts on any sums of money exceeting \$20, is dependent on the circumstances a ttending the case.

Ordinarily at law no person is bound to give a receipt for money paid. The receipt is an instrument of evidence useful only to the person to whom it is given—if he needs a receipt it is necessary for him to furnish the Stamp or to stamp the receipt, it required, b fore it is eigned. The person who receives the money is not obliged to give a receipt unless the other party furnishes the proper stamp.

If a porson gives a receipt unless the other party furnishes the proper stamp.

If a porson gives a receipt without requiring that the party to whom it is given shall furnish the stamp, the maker of the receipt must binneel's stamp the paper before he delivers it.
