21 and 22 years, and have resided in the election district ten days as aforesaid, shall be entitled to vote,
although they shall not have paid taxes.

If any person shall prevent, or attempt to prevent any officer of any election under this act from holding, such election or use or threaten any violence to any such efficer, or shall interrupt or improperly interfere with him in the execution of his duty, or shall block up the widow or the avenue to any window where the same may be holding, or shall rictously disturb the peace at such election, or shall use intimidating threats, force or violence, with a design to influence or overswe any elector or prevent him from voting, to restrain the freedom of choice, such a person on conviction, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars, and imprisoned for any time not less than one month nor more than twelve months, and if it shall be shown to the Court where the trial of such offence shall be had, that the person so offending was not a resident of the city, ward or district, or township where the said effence was committed, and not entitled to yot a fine of not less than \$100 and not more than \$1000, and be imprisoned not less than six months or more than two years.
