President Johnson has appointed the Hon. James Johnson Provisional Governor of Georgia, and the Hon. Andrew J. Hamilton Provisional Governor of Texas.

Gen. Sherman will be the Democratic candidate for Governor of Ohio, this fall. That's certain, and so is his election, notwithstanding Halleck and Stanton's onslaughts.

The "Loyal Leagues" are beginning to smash up all over the country. This is a good riddance of bad rubbish. Their days were prolonged somewhat beyond the age of the Know Nothing Councils.

Through the exertions of a few narrow-minded politicians in Harrisburg, the intended celebration of the 4th of July in that city has fallen through.

A delegation of prominent Democrats called upon the President last week. They were kindly received and had a pleasant interview.

Mrs. Lincoln and the National Monument Association, at Springfield, Illinois, have got into a serious quarrel about the location of the monument of the late President.

Mrs. Lincoln demands that the monument be erected at Oak Ridge, some distance from Springfield; that a deed of the property should be made to her and her children, and that it should also be used as the last resting place of herself, her children and their descendants.

Hon. Henry Wilson, republican U. S. Senator from Massachusetts, is "embarrassing the government."

Wendell Phillips, the leader of the radical republicans, denies that he advocated, in a recent speech, the repudiation of the war debt of the United States, and says that he spoke only of repudiating the rebel debt.

ANOTHER ACCESSION. The conservative policy of the Democratic party is daily receiving encouragement from the ablest and patriotic of the Republicans.

The negroes continue to crowd, by thousands and tens of thousands, to the towns and cities, where no provisions are made for their support, and the consequence is that thousands are weekly dying of starvation.

Failing to make engagements with their negroes, and despairing even of their ultimate return, many of the planters have engaged white men to work for them, and to take the place of their negroes.
