Professor Agassiz.

The news that the eminent Professor Agassiz was seized with paralysis was received last week with the deepest regret, and the tidings of his death, which occurred on Sunday evening last, will awaken the most profound sorrow throughout the country and the world. As one of the foremost men of science of this or any age, though a Swiss by birth, and an American by adoption and citizenship, he was truly a cosmopolitan in feeling, lu character, and in reputation, and his loss is a calamity to the world at large. Being one of the most indefatigable of workers, accomplishing the task of many ordinary men within a given space of time, he has doubtless suffered from over-exertion. He was attacked with paralysis early last week, and without any favor able change he remained under the power of disease until Sunday evening, when he expired.

Louis John Rudolph Agassiz was of French descent, his family having been one of those driven abroad by the edict of Nantes against the Huguenots. He was the son of six generations of clergymen. His father was pastor of the Protestant parish of St. Imier, in the ancient Bishopric of Bosel. His mother was the daughter of a physician, in the Canton de Vaud. Louis was born May 28, 1807, in the parish of Mottier, Switzerland. He received an academical education in the Canton of Berne. In 1824 he went to Zurich, as a medical student, thence to Heldelberg University, and continued his medical studies. and studied zoology under Leuckart and botany under Bischoff. In 1827 he entered the University of Munich. He early became distinguished in the department of Natural Science, and was made in 1832 professor of Natural History in the College of Neufchatel. Having visited the United States in 1846 and excited great interest by his lectures, he was invited by Professor Bache, of the Coast survey; to use its facilities for the prosecution of his researches, an offer which induced him to take up his residence in the United States. In 1848 he became a professor in the newly founded scientific school at Cambridge, Mass., which he has since made the sentre of operations which have extended to every part of the United States and almost circumscribed the American Continent .- Ex.

Two of the Bender family of murderers were arrested last week at Bivingsville, Spartanburg county, S. C. Steps have also been taken to arrest his son, Joshua Bender, and his wife, who are living in North Carolina, near Hickory Station, on the Western North Carolina Railroad. It is learned that this man Thomas West, a shoemaker by trade, near Bivingsville, and moved West with his family about 17 years ago. The name of Bender must have been assumed by them when they moved West, or when they commenced the life of robbers and murderers. The old man and his wife moved back to the county a short time since, and settled in the neighborhood in which they formerly lived, without any suspicion of being remembered by the name of Webb by some of the old citizens who knew them many years ago.
