The Secretary of the Treasury estimates the deficiencies in the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30 next at \$852,051.

On Tuesday next the Democratic members of our State Legislature are to choose a U. S. Senator. It looks as if Wallace, of Clearfield, would be the successful man.

The public debt statement for the month of December shows that the debt of the United States on the 31st of December was \$2,280,388,683.18—cash in treasury, \$138,749,81.16 debt less cash in treasury, \$2,141,638,872.02, being an increase of \$3,639,937.88 during the month of December.

A deputy constable appointed to look into the condition of the factory children of Massachusetts has made a report to the Governor. He says there are 63,000 children in that State growing up in ignorance, in consequence of their employment at too early an age and too exclusively in the factories.

The Emigration Commissioners of New York city have asked the N. Y. Legislature to increase the head money tax on arriving emigrants, which is paid by the vessel bringing them, from the present rate of \$1.50 to \$2.50.

The Secretary of State is at present conducting negotiations with the Hawaiian Commissioner at Washington, for the formation of a B. friendly Treaty between the United States and the Sandwich Islands.

The American Newspaper Directory is an epitome of newspaper history. It is also regarded as an official register of circulations. This feature, requires the exercise of care to prevent it from leading to abuses.

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The Basis for 1875.

The editor of the Hazleton Sentinel, in his issue of the 8th Inst., commenting upon the difficulty between the operators and miners, very sensibly remarks: "Considering the present high prices of coal, which is not the fault of the miners, but the result of the coal, combination, we cannot condemn the propriety of asking for a reduction of wages at the present time. The high prices of coal is the result of the combination, and not the fault of the miners. This combination is mainly composed of the great Railroad Corporations. It is cheap coal necessary to the revival of trade, why is not the rate of transportation reduced? Why restrict the production of coal? Why combine to advance the price of coal as the season advances? We favor the basis of 1871 as a most equitable arrangement. When the price of coal advanced, the wages of the men advanced; when the price of coal receded, the wages of the men declined. There was no limit, as we understand it, to this sliding scale. The operators of the Lehigh Region were doing well under this basis, and the miners were happy and contented. Why not continue this arrangement indefinitely? The business community suffers in proportion to a reduction of wages, and we hope, that the interests of all concerned, that the operators and miners of the Lehigh Region will take a common-sense view of the situation, and arrange for a basis similar to that of 1871, and not be controlled by other outside considerations or influences."

Pennsylvania Legislature.

In the House of Representatives, on Tuesday last, Mr. Gorman, from the selected committee on Louisiana affairs, made the following report, which was adopted by a strict party vote, 102 Democrats to 5 Republicans:

Whereas, Under the Constitution of the United States the use of the Federal army in the suppression of domestic violence can be invoked only on application of a Legislature, or Executive when the Legislature cannot be convened; and

Whereas, On the first Monday of January, the day prescribed by the Constitution of Louisiana for the meeting of the General Assembly of that Commonwealth, at a time when the Legislature was convened and in process of organization, a portion of the Federal army, under the authority of the United States, placed at the disposal of the so-called Governor of Louisiana, forcibly ejected from their seats persons claiming to be lawfully elected members of the Legislature; and

Whereas, This act of usurpation and violence has been sanctioned and approved by the President of the United States; and

Whereas, It is the constitutional right and prerogative of the Legislature of a free State to judge of the qualifications of its own members; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we commend the forbearance exercised by those whose rights were so unconstitutionally violated. We assure them of the sympathy felt for them by all who are jealous of the preservation of the principles of civil liberty, upon which our Government is founded.

Resolved, That copies of the foregoing be forwarded by the Speaker of this House to the President of the United States, the Senators and Representatives in Congress from this State, and to the Governors of the several States.

Things to be Done. Under the above caption, the N. Y. Weekly Witness, of last Saturday, discusses as follows: "The beginning of a year, naturally suggests plans for the future, and this nation has a good deal to do in 1875. It would enter 1875 with all the credit the great Republic should enjoy."

The currency should not only be uniform but at par with specie, so that it will be worth its face anywhere in the world. This could be accomplished at once by assimilating all our coins to the American trade dollar, steadily authorized by law, and making greenbacks and national bank notes payable in that standard coin.

"2. All examinations into past swindles and casualties, which are either few nor small, should be pushed forward and concluded by appropriate punishments for the guilty before 1875. We cannot continue to wash our soiled linen before the eyes of the world during our centennial or double jubilee year.

"4. Civil as well as political rights should be accorded, as a matter of justice, to all American citizens. We cannot afford to prohibit one individual on account of color or origin, and much less four or five millions.

"In view of these momentous and essential measures of reform, and others of less note, there should be not only diligence on the part of the present Congress, but an extraordinary session should, in case of need, assemble on the fourth of March next."
