An old claim against Chili was recently settled by the payment of \$20,.. 000 to our Secretary of State. The particulars of the original of the claim are thus given in the New Bedford (Mass.) Standard: The ship Good Return, of New Bedford, Job Terry, master, arrived at Talcahuanna, Chili, May 23d, 1832, in distress, having lost her rudder on the 18th. She had 13,285 gallons of sperm oil, 88,226 gallons of whale oil, and 22,000 pounds of whalebone on board. The vessel was detained by the Chillan Government, according to Captain Terry, "on the miserable pretext of a few pounds of tobacco found in the chest of the sailors," of the presence of which the boarding offlcer was informed. Captain Terry was told that if he would give the customs officers 50 or 60 ounces of gold they would let the ship go, or else they would make all the trouble they could. The yessel was detained until October 27th. An estimate of damages amounting to \$36,041 65 was made by parties interested, and another estimate amountounting to \$37,165 was made by a Committee of British Naval Officers appointed by Lord Townshend, of the British frigate Dublin. Captain Terry, who was the largest owner of the vessel, called on every President from Jackson to Lincoln in relation to his claim, and frequently stated that if the Govern-ment would give him a letter of mar-que he would collect the claim without any further trouble to the Government. Claims usually grow by lapse of time, but this one, although nearly half a century old, has dwindled down to nearly one half its original amount.

Saturday morning was the coldest of the season in northern New York and the New Eugland States. At Man-chester, Concord, Franklin and other piaces in New Hampshire the theremometer marked 20 to 35 degrees below zero; at Glen's Fall and Whitehall, N. Y., it was 32 to 37 below, and at Warrensburg., N. Y., 41 below. In Maine, the marking in that part of the State between Portland and White River Junction ranged from 32 to 40 degrees below zero, while at Bangor the mercury congenied. Travel on some of the railroads was delayed by heavy snow, and all outdoor work was stopped by the intense cold. The weather at Toronto was clear but extremely cold, and many of the railroads in Canada were obstructed by snow drifts. The harvor at Newport, R. I., is completely frozen, and the depots and cars in Newport are filled with an accumulation of steamboat freights, which cannot be sent forward until navigation is open. Through trains on the Eris Railway were delayed on Saturday by heavy drifts on the Buffalo and Western divisions of the road. A Boston dispatch of last night reports a continuance of the Polar
