Mrs. Ann Carroll Fitzhogh Smith, the widow of the late Gerrit Smith, died at Peterboro', on Saturday, surrounded by her children, grandchildren, and other relatives. Win. A. Wallace. Penalties by fine and imprisonment are provided for violations of the act, and the United States Courts are to try offences under it to the exclusion of the State Courts. There is also a provision that no one possessing all other qualifications which are or may be prescribed by law, shall be disqualified for service as a grand or petit juror in any United States or State Court on account of race, color or previous condition of servitude. The Civil Rights bill as it finally passed was greatly changed from the form in which it was originally introduced by Senator Sumner. His bill embraced schools, churches and other institutions, whilst the law as finally adopted is confined to inns, public conveyances, places of amusements and jury services.

NEW YORK AND PENNSYLVANIA .-In the second annual report of the Bureau of Statistics of Pennsylvania there is an interesting table showing the movement of population in the States of New York and Pennsylvania for eighty years. In 1790 New York had a population of 340,120, and Penn-20 years New York distanced Penna. increasing the population at the rate of 73 per cent. in the first decade, the rate of 38 per cent. In 1820 New York had a population of 1,872,111, Pennsylvania I, 047,507. tenth year preceding 4870 the rate of increase in New York was nearly 13 per cent., and that of Pennsylvania over 21 per cent, If the same rates should be observed for three more decades, the population of New York in 1900 will be 6.311,671 and that of Pennsylvania 6,-268,787, a difference of only 42,884. The elements of increase are apparently in favor of Pennsylvania. Her great gain, outside of Philadelphia, is in the mining and manufacturing districts. In another table of the statistics it is shown that while the population of Lancaster increased from 1860 to 1870, at the rate of less than 15 per cent., that of Pittsburg, (exclusive of additions by annexation), increased at the rate of 75 per cent., that of Allegheny at the rate of rate af 189 per cent.; Scranton, 280; Titusville, 1872; Lock Haven, 109; Williamsprot, 183; Altoona, 195; Chester, 104, and New Cartie, Lawrence county, a coal and iron mining place, 227 per cent. The rate of increase in the smaller places does not have much effect on the total population but it is worthy of notice that the population of three such cities as Pittsburg, Alle-gheny, and Scranton, has been increased, exclusive of additions by annexation, from 87,142, in 1860, to 172,526 of in 1870. The population of these three places has been more than doubled in ten years.

The New Senate.

Without mentioning money at all, it just doubles the rate of postage on every one of the following descriptions of articles:"Books," "pamphlets," "maps," "prints," "engravings," "translent magazines, periodicals and newspapers," "circulars," "handbills," "posters," "occasional publications," "prospectuses," "book manuscripts," "proof sheets," "corrected proof sheets," "blanks," "flexible patterns," "samples of merchandise," "sample cards," "phonographic paper," "letter envelopes," "postal envelopes and wrappers," "cards," "plain and ornamental paper," "photographs," "seeds," "cuttings," "bulbs," "roots," "scions," and all other articles usually sent by mail, except letters and newspapers and periodicals mailed by the publishers. As the law stood prior to this little amendment, any person could send the foregoing articles by mail at the rate of one cent for every two ounces; now the rate is one cent for every ounce. The rate is doubled, and the additional cost to those who use the Post-office for sending these articles runs up to millions of dollars every year.
