The second annual report of the Philadelphia Centennial Directors says: "To fully complete the work and bear its expenses to the end, we need to raise \$2,500,000, and it rests with the people to supply the necessary means. If the number of paying admissions to the Exhibition at 50 cents each shall reach 10,000,000—a number but little exceeding the admissions to the Paris Exposition of 1867—the Board will be able to return every dollar to the stockholders." The report of the Treasurer shows the receipts up to April 1 to have been \$1,436,445; cash on hand, \$639,568.

The Postmaster-General has canceled the fraudulent mail contracts awarded to Hines, Laughlin, Delaney, Wells, and Addings.

Commercial depression continues in Peru. Commissioners have been despatched to London to conclude a contract for disposing of the hundred thousand tons of guano for any market except the United States.
