—The London Times opens a leading article, discussing the issues involved in the Ohio elections, with the following observations: "The public debt of the United States is largely held by English men and English women, as also are American railway securities, municipal debentures, and, in short, every kind of transferable property owned in shares. The pecuniary interest of our countrymen in the stability of American credit cannot be precisely estimated, but if we dared to fix the amount by conjecture it would appal some timid souls and amaze all who are not in the habit of watching the currents of floating capital. Yet at this moment American politicians are gambling with the credit of their country, and their operations excite but the most languid interest in this country, though upon that credit depends the fate of many millions of English money. Presently, it may be, the money markets of Europe will be roused to a consciousness of what these reckless politicians are striving to effect in the United States, and a sudden awakening may produce a dangerous panic."

—A despatch from Washington states that the President has offered the position of Secretary of the Interior to Hon. Zachariah Chandler, who has accepted, and on Tuesday took his seat. Mr. Chandler was born in Bradford, N. H., in 1813, and was for many years a merchant in Detroit, Michigan. In 1851 he was elected Mayor of Detroit, and in 1852 was an unsuccessful candidate for Governor. In 1857 he was chosen United States Senator to succeed Gen. Lewis Cass, and was re-elected in 1863 and 1869. Last winter Mr. Chandler was a candidate for re-election, but the Democrats uniting with disaffected Republicans defeated him and elected Judge Christiancy as his successor.

—The test cases in the United States Circuit Court against Richmond merchants, for failure to stamp bank checks, went against the Government, on the ruling of Judge Bond, that the jury, in order to convict, must be satisfied that the defendants intended to defraud the Government of its revenue. All similar suits were thereupon dismissed.
