The election in this county last Tuesday resulted in the choice of the entire Democratic county tickes, by majoritles ranging from 67 to 403. The State was carried by the Republicans, the majority being, as near as we can now state, 15,000. We publish a supplement with to day's Issue of the CAR-BON ADVOCATE, giving the official vote cast in this county. This table, if preserved, will be useful to our patrons for future reference.

-It is intimated by a telegram from Washington that the questions arising from the continuance of the insurrection in Cuba may compel some action by the United States, and that a decision " may at any moment be forced upon us by occurrences either in Spain or Cuba." The President, it is said, does not desire the annexation of Cuba, but its elevation into an independent Republic. At the same time, the present polley of the Government in the matter " is declared to be one of expectancy."

-The proceedings of the Third District Court of Utah, ordering the imprisonment of Brighman Young until \$9,500 of alimony be paid by him to Eliza Young, have been brought to the attention of the Attorney General. The question presented is whether the arrest of Brighman Young, could be made on the ground claimed by the woman for the reason that her marriage with Young was illegal, it being contrary to the laws of the United states, and that she was, therefore, merely his concubine. and cannot take advantage of her own wre ng. The subject will be brought before the Cabinet with a view of determining the exact statue of the case. The subject excites much interest in Executive and judicial circles.

-The repudiation by Turkey of balf of its debt has created great excitement among English capitalists. It is said that Turkish bonds have been regarded for a decade past as a gambling stock, it being well known that the interest was paid from the proceeds of new loans. Turkey began borrowing immediately after the Crimean war, and has gone on borrowing ever since, being tempted into needless debt and extravagance by the rendiness of capitalists to nouncing the Sultan and his Grand Vizier as scoundrels and bankrupts, and they express fears that if one-half the debt can be paid by repudiation now, the quick-witted Orientals will inot be slow to discover that the other half can be paid by repudiation next January. There seems to be general apprehension that the Khedive of Egypt will follow the example of his Suzerain.

Founder's Day at Lafayette.

The faculty of Lafayette College having resolved that "hereafter the Wednesday following the 21st day of October, in each year, be recognized as the anniversary of the founding and gift of Pardee Hall, and that it be set apart forever by Lafayette College, its Paculty, and students, under the name of Founder's Day, as a day of commemoration of the founder, Ario Pardee," the usual college exercises were suspended on the 21st, and the day was celebrated by the Faculty and students a 1d friends of the college. After prayer by President Cattell, Dr. Green, senior Professor Dean of the Scientific Department, delivered an address. After discussing the history of Scientife investigation to its relation to Christianity, he referred to the basis upon which all the American colleges of our land were founded, and spoke of the seals of Harvard, Yale, Brown, University, Amberst, and others, as having in them a recognition of the truth of the theme of his address:

He next turned to speak of Lafayetta, in connection with feligion. He told how it had been founded in prayer by its first President, Dr. Junkin; how once when he, who afterward became its honores President, was confined to his room by sickness, he had asked a certain William Thomas, a carganter, who was then at work on his farm, to conduct family worship in a room near

the foot of the stairs where he could the foot of the stairs where he could hear very weil from his sick room above. But on one occasion he put the service upon his appraptice. Mathew Laird. Says the doctor: "The young man's prayer went into my heart, it was fervent and tender. When my wife came up to my chamber. I said to her, 'It God spares my life that young man shall enter the ministry." It pleased the Lord to spare my life, I fulfilled my yow, and Laird went as a missionary to Affica and thence early ascended to the heavenly glory with his devoted wife. That prayer of Mathew Laird is in a certain sense the starting point of Lacertain sense the starting point of La-fayette College, as it was the first link in the clain of Divine Providence that led me into the Department of Edu-cation. I received him into my family, and aided him in the expense of his education until I saw him depart to foreign fields. This turned my mind more fully to the subject of Christian education for the ministery, and from that day to this it has been my direct life-work. In removing to Milton one obwork. In removing to animon the poung men, My mind was attracted to the Manuel Labor Academy of Pennsylvania, located at Germantown, and the idea of combining with study the healthful labor of the hands, and so to contribute to the expense of education, got possession of my mind, and the de-velopement of that idea resulted in La

velopement of that idea resulted in La fayette College. All the subsequent history of the col-lege is that of a Christian institution. Its Presidents and Professors have conducted their work with reference to the high claims of the Gospel, in training the young and preparing them for the great work of this life. The speaker then touched upon the question of cneminational colleges, and briefly dis-cussed a few of the scientific questions that disturb the minds of a certain class of students of to day, closing with these words: "Let us trust in the Lord with all our heart and lean not unto our own understanding. In all our ways, in our studies daily, let us acknowledge Him, for he has promised to direct our paths."
