

Lehigh Valley at the Centennial. The Bethlehem Times gives the following news in regard to the display of the Lehigh Valley at the Centennial:

The committee that had been appointed to see that the Lehigh Valley would be properly represented at the Centennial, and who have had a number of conferences and consultations, had hoped to secure sufficient space in one portion of the building to make a collective display of our natural and mechanical products. This space could not be obtained, as the products of the various manufacturers would have to be placed in the classified departments to which their products naturally belong.

When this was learned, these gentlemen made individual application for the space each desired, and in all cases this has been granted, we understand, and the necessary permits forwarded to such applicants. Space has been given for the exhibition of the "Natural Products of the Lehigh Valley." This space is on a passage way on the east side of the Main Building, extending 33 feet south from South avenue to a 10 feet wide avenue, including both sides of a passage way. The west side is devoted exclusively to the iron interest, and is divided into spaces of 18 inches square, each. The space being given at South avenue, has been assigned as follows: Catawqua Manufacturing Company, 18 inches square; Durham Iron Company, do.; Glendon Iron Company, do.; Peter Ufer, do.; Keystone Iron Company, do.; W. H. Carter & Co., do.; Northampton Iron Company, do.; Bethlehem Iron Company, 4 spaces, each 18 inches square; Lehigh Iron Company, Allentown, 18 inches square; Emma Iron Company, do.; Millerstown Iron Company, do.; Thomas Iron Company, do.; Allentown Rolling Mill Company, 2 spaces of 18 inches square each; and the Allentown, the Crane, the Lehigh Valley, the Carbon and the Saucun Iron Companies each one space of 18 inches square, thus filling the space of 33 feet. On the other side of the passage way, is the Champion Slate Company with a front of 15 feet on the passage and 6 feet on the avenue, extending back to another passage way. Then comes the Lehigh Zinc Company with a space of 5 feet front and 6 feet deep to the rear passage way. The Lehigh Slate Company (Mr. McDowell) of Slatington takes all of the balance of the block, 13 feet by 6, excepting about 4 feet square in the southeast corner, which has been assigned to Stewart & Co., of South Easton, for a display of their wires.

Back of the space allotted to the iron interest from the space given to the Lehigh Iron Company to the 10 feet wide avenue, an area of 150 square feet, is the space allotted to the anthracite coal of the Lehigh Valley, which department is in charge of Dr. Linderman of this place. This space has two fronts, one of 15 and the other of 10 feet. The space allotted to the natural products of the Lehigh Valley is all that could be desired, and is in such a position as will do our products full justice.

The iron men will make a fine display. They will exhibit as follows: The ore, the fuel, the flux, the different grades of pig iron, the slag and an assay of slag, &c. Each company will show how many furnaces, rolling mills, &c., it owns, and the maximum capacity of each, thus showing the world what the Valley is capable of producing. The Bethlehem Iron Company has secured four spaces for its exhibitions, which will be filled as follows: 1, pig iron; 2, Bessemer iron; 3, spiegel-eisen; 4, steel. The Allentown Rolling Mill Company has two spaces, one for pig and the other for manufactured iron. The Champion Company will exhibit a huge block of slate, slabs, curbing, posts, steps, &c. The Zinc Company will send specimens of its ore, blends, bars, plate, &c. Stewart & Co. will show their wire, and the display of anthracite coal will be novel and complete. It will thus be shown that the natural products of our Valley will be fully represented at the Centennial Exhibition.
